**Minutes of the Annual Parochial Church Meeting,  
Held at 7.50pm, 17th May 2021 in St. Mary's Church, Woodbridge.**

**1. Minutes of the Annual Parochial Church meeting held on 20<sup>th</sup> October 2020.**

Minutes were approved from the last APCM proposed by Mr David Berridge  
Seconded by Ms Rita James  
Carried unanimously

**2. Election of Lay Members to the Parochial Church Council**

There were seven vacancies on the PCC, two unfilled positions from last year, three positions from people coming to the end of their term, and two from members who had stepped down. Nominations had been received for five of the places.

Mr Jeremy Hawksley proposed by Ms Rita James and seconded by Mrs Susan Todd

All were agreed unanimously. The new members were reminded that this would be for a term of five years' service, as per last year's APCM.

Fr. Nigel thanked those members of the PCC stepping down: Sue Todd, Sarah Lines and Jeremy Hawksley for their contribution, and welcomed the new members.

**3. Parochial Church Council Accounts**

The Trustees Annual Report and Financial Report for year ending 31<sup>st</sup> December 2020 accompanied with explanatory notes had been available prior to the meeting. Mr David Sharples gave a description of the Accounts.

David began by saying that all the accounts had been agreed and all signed off. The accounts this year had taken on a new format in the Charity Commission style and featured 'Objectives & Activities', 'Achievement & Performance' & 'Future Plans'. Fr. Nigel was thanked by David for helping with the clearer layout of accounts, and Michael Holland was thanked for producing the new style of accounts.

Every cost had been kept down during the lockdown period resulting in the deficit being lower than was expected at £11K. There had been some expenditure during the year. The maintenance to the bell frame had been completed and giving device had been installed in the church.

The various bank accounts had been reviewed and two new bank accounts opened. Cater Allen who held the old accounts, which made life particularly difficult, and these accounts were to be closed along with other existing accounts and all are to be moved over to new ones in the next few months. Changes had also been made as to who operates the accounts, and this has been taken on by Mrs Katherine Lowe, who has been trained. The new treasurer would find the new accounting system and accounts easier to manage.

In the set of accounts for 2020 there had been recognition of the bequest left to St. Mary's Church, Woodbridge by Dr. James Harper. Professional advice was sought and as probate had been executed this bequest had to be accounted for; the estimated amount of the bequest is £700K

Enormous thanks were given to David for dealing with a huge change in the accounting and also for his service over the past ten years.

Accounts were proposed by Mr Tony Hubbard and seconded.

#### **4. Appointment of Account Examiners**

The finance committee are to look for a lower cost provider to examine the accounts. Once found this will be reviewed by the PCC.

#### **5. Report on the Electoral Roll**

Electoral roll was two more than last year standing at 190 at today's date. This is a very low number and work needs to be done to persuade people to enrol. The list of the current roll is at the back of the church.

#### **6. Report from the PCC**

#### **Report from the Deanery Synod**

The Deanery Synod had struggled over the past year. As a reflection of the church in the 35 parishes, seven had no representatives to the Deanery Synod. The next Deanery Synod meeting is 26<sup>th</sup> June 2021 and they are looking for a venue large enough to hold the event. This could be Orford church or here at St. Mary's, Woodbridge. We are to take stock of the new Deanery plan as we come out of lockdown, this was to happen in September, but will not happen then as there is a new team of clergy in the deanery.

#### **7. Report on Fabric and ornaments of the Church**

Thanks to Mr Simon Morris for looking after the building. Also, a thank you when called out for the disturbances in the porch.

#### **8. Chairperson's Report**

It goes without saying that the last year has not been at all normal and it seems extraordinary that my first APCM here was only 7 months ago! Despite two Lockdowns, we managed to celebrate in between, both Christmas and Easter and we had as many people as we could squeeze in. I am grateful to Val and Veronica and all our sides-people/cleaners who made that possible with their gloves on and armed with their bottles of Dettol! Thanks to Bob and the choir also for taking the rules seriously enough without downing tools completely. We did well to do what we did, and no-one caught on fire at our memorable Easter Vigil! Also, to those who have made the re-openings of church for private prayer possible, a big thank you. Let's hope those days of imposed restrictions are soon behind us, as we gradually ease out into safer waters.

We legally became a United Benefice from the beginning of 2021 but it is still early days to see how we can work more closely together. What kind of collective future might be encouraged is something both our PCCs are meeting up for at our combined 'Away Day' on July 3<sup>rd</sup>, which is a great start. If you turn to the heading 'Future Plans' on p.5 of the Trustees Annual Report, this is highlighted in points 3a and 3b.

I have to confess that all four points have been written by me on behalf of the PCC Trustees. I have had plenty of thinking time and space, but I have also consulted and met all those involved with the different areas covered, whether by Zoom or in person. I really have done my best to keep our corporate church interests as active as possible and have already begun to prioritise where I believe greater teamwork is needed. If we turn to section 4, only one group officially exists and that's the newly formed 'Communications Group' which has been really busy behind the scenes (as well in front) when literally, livestreaming many of our services and big occasions. I think particularly of the National Day of Reflection in March – which may well become an annual event to mark those lives lost nationally to Covid-19. I think of yesterday with the gold balloons and next Sunday with everyone wearing something red. We will look back on these recorded moments as reminders how well we have kept going during a pandemic and, hopefully, how our faith has sustained and supported us. Of course, it is an ongoing discussion whether we should continue to offer Zoom and livestreaming worship but if people respond positively and enthusiastically to that thought, then I and many others will concur.

I was surprised when I came, to find there was no Finance Committee (or support group if you prefer), and that is now going to change because the days of leaving everything for just one person to do is just unreasonable. But as David has said, we are modernizing the way we do our banking and have already made some significant improvements. And in my time, Michael and Katherine have played a big part in easing the burdens of everyday responsibility for what I am sure you will all agree, is a complex set of Finances. We are also wanting to set up a Fabric & Maintenance Committee – again, to share the burden of work and detail and time involved. If I told you that correspondence over the Churchyard pillars and gates has continued over more than 20 years, aren't I the lucky Incumbent to see this restoration and improvement soon to be realised?

On the asterisked 4 c) d) and e) sections, I am suggesting we could explore sharing these opportunities for imaginative service, with both our churches, moving forwards. 'No man or woman is an island' so I really want you to know now how passionate I am about everyone using their God-given gifts and, freely and willingly. Bridges are better than walls.

If I may jump now to sections 2a) and b) this planning is very much under way – as you will have read concerning the revamped 'Building Strategy group' with some really keen and excited new members. I really want everyone to see the drawings at the back tonight and the many copies we have around the noticeboards for you to be encouraged by before you go. A big thank you to Diane in particular who wrote up the Terms of Reference for the St Mary's House Project back in 2013.

I must be careful not to say that Suffolk moves slowly but instead for me to say tonight: a huge THANK YOU to everyone involved for arriving where we are. It is going to be expensive (but we have a good Legacy endorsement now) and it is still ambitious, not least because we are looking at developing and modernising the whole of the building and not just part of it; but it really is now that we need your help to get going and to launch our plans and, Appeal, sometime in the Autumn. Alongside this we have to get much more community interest and support in why we want to do this and who it is ultimately for.

It is for the whole community of Woodbridge – and just to give you an example, the former Caterpillar Children's Centre (run by East Suffolk Council) is in need of a new home since closure and we could be that helping hand to enable them to get back in action - at the heart of Market Hill and under the umbrella of St Mary's. Before the summer holidays, we will dedicate a Sunday to saying a lot more to

our congregations and being more transparent (instead of secretive) because, I do believe, the Lord is at work in this Project and has been from day one.

This leads me to point 1 and that our ministry to local families has undoubtedly suffered a setback for obvious reasons. The update on our own activities does or should give us all a glimmer of hope because the families are still around us and finding their feet post- Covid. But as with everything I am saying, this ministry can only happen with teamwork and new volunteers, people who are passionate about the energy of God infusing.

Finally, I want to say a big thank you to Fr John and Peter who continue to help me and you, liturgically, and in so many other pastoral ways; to say how sorry I was to lose Siw Carlsson so early on. I shall miss her great qualities of wisdom and mischief and her commitment to pastoral support, particularly at Seckford Alms-houses', and conducting many funerals too, over recent years. Dear Andy is also very much in our prayers as he bravely faces chemo and radiotherapy treatments concurrently. I saw him and Sue in the shop last week and at the moment he is a model patient, I have to say, who never complains at all.

I am happy to take any questions you may have because this is not supposed to be a sermon. I apologise if I have preached a little!

# Reports for 2021

## Safeguarding

At the time of writing and recruitment checks are behind schedule, although neither has contributed to any increased risk to members of the congregation. Evidence of this is that individuals have made contact with the PSO about potential safeguarding issues, which suggest that reporting procedures are understood. The PSO has liaised with the diocese and no issue has yet to reach the threshold for further action.

## Charities supported by St. Mary's 2021

Throughout the year, individuals continued to pursue their own favoured charities - not least the food bank co-ordinated by the Woodbridge Salvation Army - and supported also from our own Harvest Festival. Some members continued to make donations to The Children's Society and discrete groups contributed to funds for other needs. As a church we began negotiations to set up a hub for the asylum seekers expected to be accommodated locally, but their arrival in the town did not happen. Offers of practical help were made too.

Some of the products stocked in the Church Shop were from Fair Trade and other ethical and sustainable producers and companies, while we continued to serve Fair Trade coffee and tea throughout the year and, indeed, also ran a couple of FT coffee mornings.

Other causes that benefited from specific monetary collections, or giving in kind, included:

## **Choir**

Another very unusual year overall, but one in which we gradually began to emerge from the Covid Curse!

We had very limited notice from the Government about when we could begin to sing again on Palm Sunday, and a maximum of 6 singers was imposed.

Fortunately, the 6 choristers that I asked immediately responded positively so that we could sing the hymns on Palm Sunday.

Thereafter, we had 6 singers at each service throughout Easter. The choir members were so very understanding and cooperative with my selection of choristers on a rota system. I was truly grateful for their support, and we were able to sing hymns, Responsorial Psalms and the odd easy anthem during that time.

We continued to raise a choir of 6 throughout the next 3 months, producing a simple anthem during the communion on each occasion.

In August, we were allowed to have a bigger choir once again, limited only by space, in that we had to remain socially distanced to sing.

It was in August (6<sup>th</sup>) that we were all devastated by the news of Rev Andy Todd's death. Not only was Andy a much loved assistant Curate, but he had been, firstly a bass and thereafter a tenor (when I really needed tenors!), in the choir for 30+ years.

We were all honoured to sing at his Requiem Mass on 2<sup>nd</sup> September and on this occasion, we created space enough for a virtually full choir, who sang out their hearts.

In 2021, we celebrated our Patronal Festival, for the first time, on 15<sup>th</sup> August. Though a number of choristers were away, owing to it being in the middle of the school holidays, we managed to sing a 'Simon Clover arrangement for SATB' of the Schubert Ave Maria, in which Helena Galley sang the solo part beautifully. It appeared to be gratefully received by the congregation.

On September 5<sup>th</sup>, Patronal Festival was celebrated at St. Mary's, Great Bealings and a volunteer choir of 14 drove over to take part in and sing at the service. It was a lovely occasion followed by a barbecue in the churchyard.

On November 9<sup>th</sup>, I became 70 years old, and I had previously made the decision to retire as choirmaster when I became 70.

Fr. Nigel suggested that we celebrate my 45 years with a service, and I elected to have a Choral Evensong on the Feast of Christ the King on November 21<sup>st</sup>.

Our full St. Mary's Choir, supplemented by a number of past choristers – some from as far away as Somerset and Nottinghamshire, sang the most lovely Evensong Service, which I delighted in sharing with them. Fr. Nigel secretly arranged for an ex-colleague and very dear friend of mine – Canon Roy Tricker – to preach the sermon.

Kind members of the congregation organised a buffet at the end of the evening, and I was presented with some very extravagant gifts from the choir and congregation.

I am so grateful to both the people who came to church to join in 'my' final service and to all those, who contributed to my touching and extravagant gifts.

I am very grateful to my fellow organists: Andrew Clarke, Andrew Garfath-Cox, John Penny, Malcolm Russell, Derek Cole, Paul Foster and Arthur Watts for all of their support and musical expertise over the years. I am also very grateful to Simon Clover (Bass), who has provided us with some excellent musical arrangements of hymns and anthems and who has been a constant support over the last few years – a very talented man.

## **Communications - Benefice Website, Social Media and St. Mary's Live-streaming**

Our communications with each other, both within and outside the Church, remain dependent on a mix of online and digital, as well as printed, because of continuing restrictions caused by the pandemic. As with most large church communities this mix has now become a recognised expectation and will remain a constant offer for the future.

Our present website was designed in 2019. It was refined in 2021 to represent the new Benefice and is our most comprehensive way of communicating. Regular weekly updates provide details of just about everything that's happening in the Benefice - the weekly pew sheet, links to service live-streams, transcripts of sermons, posters, dates & times of future events, current news, plus links to courses, videos etc.

Our Facebook page has been 'paused' in recent months but will hopefully be active again in the near future.

Improvements to upgrade our ageing and previously unreliable church sound system to a more dependable audio-visual system were completed in May 2021 and at the same time a cleverly designed two camera live-streaming set-up was installed. Our first live-stream with the new setup was on 6 June 2021. The live-streaming system allows for an operator to change to one of eight camera positions depending on where in the church the focus is required - for example the chancel, nave, lectern, font. (This is a smaller version of the system used in both Bury St Edmunds and Norwich Cathedrals.) We have 48 signed-up subscribers to our live-stream service and the number of people who watch weekly, either live or later, varies widely - anything from 55 to 115, rising to higher numbers for church festival services.

Also, in December we had the Riverside Musical theatre Company's annual festive extravaganza – a very popular evening with a full house. The capacity audience enjoyed an evening of warm fantastic singing.

In November we were also delighted to welcome back Jazz quartet, Joyspring, with a wonderful evening of music from the Great American Songbook. A very popular event, and we are looking forward to seeing Joyspring again in 2022.

In 2022, the diary is starting to look a little more like it used to in pre-pandemic days although there is a long way to go!

Ben Wale - the Lightwave hub leader for our area - gave an update on Lightwave locally and encouraged us to be in touch for support to reach out to people outside the church. Working with parishes is a priority. Ben also told us of a planned confirmation group for young people preparing for a service in September. Canon Dave Gardner and the Revd Phil Dykes then led us through some thinking about how we begin to plan for mission in the future and how we might recover from the pandemic lockdowns. A useful tool was offered for PCCs to use. This thinking was in preparation for the planned October Deanery Synod workshop to be led by Dave and Phil, as we think about our Deanery Plan. October: We were able to meet face to face in Clopton Village Hall. Over coffee and cake, we began to get to know each other better and then worked on our priorities for supporting the parishes in the future. Many wonderful ideas were formed by the working groups and are being followed up by the Deanery Mission and Pastoral Committee. A week later we held a brief Zoom consultation meeting about Lightwave and Growing in God in the Countryside led by the Ven. Sally Gaze. The priorities for your Deanery Synod for 2022 are to be: Children and Young people, Growing Younger, the Environment and Eco Church, Vocations and training for Lay and Ordained Ministries. Please watch out for details and do join your elected representatives to hear quality speakers and to learn together about the support offered to the local church in these areas. THANK YOU: a huge thank you for your contributions to Parish Share this year, as a deanery we almost made our target, and this is truly wonderful after such a difficult year.

## Elders

Elders, whose role is partly pastoral and partly liturgical, carry out a variety of activities within the church and it can be hard to separate the role of an Elder from other duties – one Elder likened this to ‘ivy woven into a fence – if you try to separate them the whole lot comes down’!

The general consensus amongst the group of Elders is that they have spent the past year gradually picking up the threads again, following various interruptions due to Covid.

Visiting local Care Homes (Grove Court, Thurleston Lodge, Haughgate House, Seckford Care and Woodbridge Lodge) to administer Extended Communion, take Morning Prayer and lead services at Christmas and Easter has resumed, wherever possible, as have home visits to members of our congregation who are too unwell / infirm to attend church in person. The latter has recently been coordinated by a retired Elder who has become our ‘unofficial Elder Administrator’.

Members of the congregation who have been reluctant or unable to return to church in person have been able to access our recorded services online (instigated and professionally produced by one of the Elders who also enables them to join us in a way that is as fully appropriate as possible). Several Elders have kept in regular phone and email contact with those who might otherwise feel isolated at home or in sheltered accommodation. Elders have also ensured that the weekly Pew Sheet is delivered, either electronically or in person, to these individuals and also to each of the Care Homes listed above.

Since January our sister church of St. Mary’s, Great Bealings has been supported by Elders leading a monthly ‘Morning Prayer with Reflection’ in this beautiful church.

Weekly Saturday Morning Prayer has continued on Zoom and is led and regularly attended by some Elders plus a couple of other members of our congregation. This service has continued to be valuable enabling us to worship together regularly, keep in touch, support each other as well as keeping us up to date with the names of members of our congregation who need our prayers. For those who attend it has proved to be a lovely way to start the weekend.

Elders have been asked to welcome the congregation as they enter the church building at the start of services and, at the same time, to keep an eye out for new people and talk to and help them.

In addition to the above Elders have continued to prepare and lead the intercessions in Sunday services and are also on the rota to read the Lesson. Elders have taken Evening Prayer and Compline, and occasionally acted as Verger at funerals, while also supporting the Rector and the mission of St. Mary’s.

## Fabric Report

The last year has mainly been one of planning, inspection and general maintenance.

Bells – A new bell rope guide was installed to replace a split guide, many thanks to Isaac Young, who carried out this work.

CCTV – The CCTV was at the end of its useful life, with a number of issues continuing to come up, and a decision made to replace it with a modern system which would be more reliable and flexible, and well as provide better quality imaging.

Sound and Vision – Similar to the CCTV system the sound system slowly becoming less reliable and was replaced by a new sound and vision system with improved sound quality and the addition of a camera system, allowing services to be livestreamed over the internet greatly increasing the outreach and flexibility of the church.

A number of general maintenance works have been carried out including sash window repairs to SMH with scheduled further repairs in Summer 2022, as well as electrical and boiler works.

We have now formed a Fabric Committee, and I look forward to working with them on future projects and tasks.

Looking ahead it is the intention to tender a contractor to carry out the outstanding quinquennial works in 2022.

In September, there were further challenges, with the increased rates of Covid in Suffolk, so that for most weeks we were missing at least one girl due to self-isolating. The girls found it very difficult to participate in group activities, as they had spent most of the year away from their peers. The unit had to re-think its activities such as introducing group games slowly. We are very grateful to the Church for allowing us to move downstairs into the small hall, which has made a difference to how we run our meetings. We had an interesting visit to the library and the girls learnt how to invent a character and create a small story out for it.

In the Spring Term the girls have worked on 'Express Myself' Skills builder, where they had fun learning about different materials, making puppets and having a go at some experiments, including one where they made lots of bubbles. All the girls have been working on interest badges at home. As a group they made a Rainbow mural which they presented to the Framfield Medical Centre in Woodbridge, where it now hangs proudly in the reception area.

We are now looking forward to more excitement in the forthcoming year.

## Junior Church - Children and Families

From the time of last year's written report, there have been activities provided for children at every Sunday Eucharist. As a result, we now have some regular attendance on Sundays from nine families. The ages of these children vary from 4 years to 10 and 11 years.

The parents of some of these families are now becoming more involved in helping with the children's activities.

The activities provided on Sundays are linked to the Gospel of the day and to the liturgical calendar of the year. The children make cards, posters, write prayers, discuss Gospel stories and values, and learn a little bit about the liturgy of the church.

In late summer, we had 15 children in the church grounds on a Saturday morning, joining in with the National Churches 'Count on Nature'. They and their parents were armed with magnifying glasses, charts and bug jars as they counted insects, birds, flowers, trees, bees and butterflies. The morning ended with the sharing of a lovely caterpillar cake!!

On Christmas Eve, all the Junior Church children dressed in Nativity costume and mimed the story in our Crib and Christingle Service. More than 50 Christingles were made by some of the children and their parents, and all were given out at the service, with a large number of families and children attending. We ended with a rousing session of the 'What's that star!' song!

Palm Sunday this year, was particularly special, with 7 children carrying handfuls of greenery, walking behind Orlando the donkey, in solemn procession to the church.

The children have led the intercession prayers in the Sunday service three times; at the Harvest Service where they also joined the choir in a harvest song; on Mothering Sunday and on Easter Sunday.

The children have received 'Bumble bee' badges (Thank you, David Berridge, for making them) and we take the title of Junior Church "B" club... always busy and spreading good things! We have a small notice board for displaying some of our work (Thank you again, David).

There is always something nice for the children to take home after all their activities, whether it be a balloon, a plant, a card to give, seeds to sow, a little cross to wear, a glass angel, or a chocolate munchmallow to eat!

In addition to Sunday activities, we offer Messy Church mornings approximately every 3 months. This, so far, has taken place on Sunday mornings from 11.15am and has ended with a shared lunch at 1pm. The uptake for Messy Church has been excellent, with an average of 15 children attending with a parent. The activities follow a theme linked with the liturgical calendar:

September Messy Church – Let's Save The Earth

## **Maintenance, Fire and Health and Safety**

During February 2021, the gutters around the Church and St Mary's House were cleared of debris. Drains and gulleys around the Church were cleared of debris and flushed through. This work was carried out by contractors. No contractors have been employed for this work since.

I have inspected the Church gutters and SMH gutters between the buildings and so far they are relatively clear of debris. It is likely a contractor will be needed to carry out a thorough clean of gutters, rain gulley's and drains later in the year.

During September and October 2021 Veronica Howe and I cleared a good deal of unwanted items from the cellar in SMH which were disposed of at the Foxhall waste facility.

Fire extinguishers and fire blankets were inspected and serviced or replaced as necessary during February this year. A fire certificate has been issued. The fire alarm system within St. Mary's House has been checked and confirmed as working correctly.

Portable Appliance Testing (PAT) was carried out during September 2021.

A major service was carried out on the Church boilers with a follow-up repair to a leaking water pipe valve in the Church. The boilers are ageing and their remaining life and subsequent replacement has been discussed a number of times, I believe. The boiler service was well overdue.

The Treasury alarm system was checked and serviced in April this year.

Minor maintenance tasks have been undertaken as and when reported, although not always promptly!

There are several major works or replacements urgently needing attention within SMH:

The electric shower unit and the door into the shower upstairs need replacing

Front outer doors are rotting and a poor fit. Probably replacement needed.

Emergency exit doors are difficult to open and close. Decaying woodwork is an issue. The crash bars which open the doors also need replacing as they appear beyond repair.

There are no Health and Safety issues to report as far as I am aware.

I would like to thank Veronica Howe for her unstinting help and guidance on a number of occasions. And my thanks to Simon Morris who has been a huge help and guide, particularly over the last twelve months or so.

## St. Mary's House Project

In January 2021, a small group of people began to meet to respond to the need '*Hope Beyond the Coronavirus Pandemic*'. This would:

- Respond to the issues of loneliness and isolation for many in our community.
- Focus on growing community resilience and promoting mental and emotional health and wellbeing.
- Grow technological capability and resilience, particularly increasing digital capacity and provision, and supporting those without online access to get online through training and support.

On 8 March 2021, the St Mary's House Project Group was formed to take these ideas forward into the re-energising of the refurbishment of St Mary's House and more, including the 'undercroft' basement extension concept previously developed by the Building Strategy Group, in response

to earlier consultation with the congregation. The main requirements from the consultation were improved access and toilet facilities, community use and income generation and community support.

This year, the Group has:

- Refocussed and reworked the Statement of Need.
- Met with the church architect to minimise the impact of the proposed 'undercroft' on the historic churchyard and to re-work the solution to providing single level access to the church through the north porch.
- Hosted separate visits by Historic England and the DAC (Diocesan (Architectural) Advisory Committee) on the best approach to maintaining the historic feel of the churchyard. A favourable response was received – with the DAC suggesting that a more specialised, considerate and contemporary design may be required to achieve a successful planning outcome.
- Appointed new Architects, Freeland Rees Roberts, to re-envision the designs for the project. The inspecting architects remain in place for St Mary's Church. The first meeting with the project architects took place on 22 March 2022.
- Obtained an outline estimate of costs from Hyams Quantity Surveyors.
- Completed a 'Measured (Topographical) Survey' of St Mary's House, the Church and Churchyard/grounds, which will be of use for detailed design work.

The congregation was able to view the concept sketches from the first round of designs, as part of the AGM which took place on 17<sup>th</sup> May 2021. The revised drawings will also be shared. Overall, the aim of the next stage is to obtain planning permission, whilst building support and interest in the local community.

After the service, we are usually around long after everyone has left, as we clear the altar and wash the chalices so that they are ready for further use. ## Time to Reflect Group

Time to Reflect continued its activities while adapting to the pandemic. The group was able to break new ground by contributing strongly to the climate change debate.

The Time to Reflect discussion group continued over Zoom.

- The first book of the year was 'Borders and Belonging: The Book of Ruth' by Pádraig Ó Tuama and Glenn Jordan which resonated strongly with issues of migration and the stranger.
- The next book was 'The Earth is the Lord's: a Biblical Response to Environmental Issues' chosen to provide a scriptural basis for our response to climate change issues in the context of COP26.
- The book chosen for the Spring term was 'Creating a Life with God: the call of ancient prayer practices' by Daniel Wolpert which has involved us trying out for ourselves a different prayer practice each week such as the Jesus Prayer and the Ignatius method, with the idea that one will become a new part of our prayer life.
- Two social events have enabled us to meet up face to face, which has been lovely.

A parish Quiet Day took place on 29th September in Brandeston Village Hall, followed by Eucharist in Brandeston Church just over the fields. The day was facilitated by Helen Randall, who took her theme from 'Little Gidding' "We shall not cease from exploration" about revisiting our spirituality in the light of Covid. About 25 people attended and enjoyed walking in the sunshine in the times for reflection.

Climate Change was addressed by five evening sessions held in the Shire Hall in October and November. The sessions, open to the whole of Woodbridge, were based around films by Tearfund and attracted a good group. Time to Reflect helped to organise the Climate Change Day of Action on 6<sup>th</sup> November, which primarily involved a march of about 250 people going from Whisstocks to the Town Hall and attracted the attention of *Look East*. This year three evening events have been held with a focus around action 'What can we do?' Members of the group will

be contributing to the Council's two days Woodbridge Climate Action event in the Community Hall at the beginning of April.

Time to Reflect is preparing ideas for this year's Quiet Day in liaison with the Rector.
