WOODBRIDGE SWIFTS NEST BOXES ON ST MARY'S HOUSE We have a dream of swifts in The Market Square. We can imagine groups of swifts swirling and calling in the early evenings in summer as we walk through or sit and enjoy the ancient surroundings. We have applied to East Suffolk Council for planning permission to install nest boxes for swifts on the front facade of St Mary's House. As this is a listed building we have to follow some stringent guidelines and provide plans for unobtrusive structures. Corona-virus restrictions have prevented us from meeting together with Father

Nigel to discuss the way forward, but we have had some useful advice from

the planners as to what will be required.

We realise that we will need some expert help and are therefore looking for willing swift enthusiasts with the requisite skills to help us. OUR NEW BENEFICE and the SECKFORD CONNECTION

Our new United Benefice can be commemorated, on the ground, so as to speak, by a walk between the two churches, with some routes taking in Seckford Hall and the surrounding area. On New Year's day several of us did

this loosely organised socially distanced walk - dogs joined in, bells were rung in both churches at midday, and many photographs were taken. Because of Covid restrictions, neither church was properly open, but commemorative books for signing were available in the


porches.


At one end is St Mary's Woodbridge, with Thomas Seckford's tomb, the Abbey House, the Shire Hall built by Thomas Seckford in 1578, Seckford Almshouses, and at the other end St Mary's Great Bealings, where the Seckford Memorial and the Tudor-brick Seckford porch can be found.

Thomas Seckford (1515 - 1587) is acknowledged as Woodbridge's main benefactor. His family held the Manor of Seckford, just outside Woodbridge from the 12th century, and the present Seckford Hall (now hotel) was built by his father on the site of

an older house. Educated at Cambridge University and Gray's Inn, Thomas Seckford was called to the bar and became a lawyer of great repute. He also held several public appointments that contributed to his position as one of the State's highest legal officers, and not long after her accession, Queen Elizabeth 1 appointed him to her Court (it is believed she actually stayed in Seckford Hall). In 1550,1563 and 1572 he was elected to Parliament by the constituents of Ipswich. He bought the manor of Woodbridge priory, which was next to St Mary's Church, in 1564 and built Abbey House as his home (now Abbey School). In 1587 he decided to donate part of his considerable wealth to the town of Woodbridge by founding and endowing some almshouses (now, much rebuilt and extended, providing the present Seckford Almshouses). He founded Woodbridge School, in memory of his parents, and the Shire Hall was also built by him.

To mark the United Benefice a new tree was planted in each of our churchyards on the Feast of the Annunciation and a Eucharist was celebrated on that evening, Thursday 25 March. Watch out for pictures in the local press!



THE LONGSHIP AND WOODBRIDGE TAPESTRY

The river Deben is the heart of Woodbridge and at the centre of this story.

The lockdown and other restrictions may have kept us at home but this has not stopped the tapestry team from continuing with their amazing work on some of the 30 plus panels for "The Longship and Woodbridge Tapestry". From "acorn to tree" all things grow. Similarly from a lighthearted suggestion the tapestry project has grown and the panels are taking shape with great skill as the 40 or so members of the team enthusiastically continue their work. The completed tapestry will show a history of the Sutton Hoo burial ship from the first acorn planted by a jay in around 400AD, through the centuries. The story's links to the town of Woodbridge and the river Deben, taking in the grave robberies during the reign of Queen Elizabeth 1, Thomas Seckford, the almshouses, the garrison, the excavation at Sutton Hoo in 1939, the present day construction of the replica ship in the Longshed, and the ship's sea trials.



The tapestry panels will eventually be hung, as each is completed, in the

gallery room when the Longshed re-opens.

BISHOP JOHN - A TRIBUTE



The Right Reverend John Waine, KCVO – at onetime the Bishop of this Diocese, and later Bishop of Chelmsford, was fondly known as 'Bish the Dish.' He earned this title for his endless good humour, his gentle kindness, his great wisdom – and those twinkling eyes! Bishop John retired to live in Grundisburgh nearly 25 years ago, but continued in active ministry up until his Passing at Christmas 2020 aged 90. In those years he was a much loved visitor and preacher in St Mary's and village churches around Suffolk. Bishop John's faith and compassion shone around him – he loved people, and would come to Woodbridge to shop

with his beloved wife Pat, happy to stop in the Thoroughfare, and talk – and listen to – churchgoers and disbelievers alike. As it was said in his obituary in the Church Times: 'Bishop John had a profound influence on many people and we have a huge reason to be grateful to God for his life, ministry, friendship, and love. May he rest in peace.'
