Our hearts and thoughts also go out today to those victims of ongoing conflicts, especially in Gaza, Ukraine, Yemen and Afghanistan. Wherever people's freedoms are denied or destroyed, and wherever innocent children's lives are cut short, we must pray for peace in the world, and **every** day.

Thank you to my colleagues in the Town Hall and the local British Legion who have again provided us with such a memorable and solemn weekend of remembering; to our local Parachute Engineer Regiment and their families who live with the dangers of being called up for combat at any given time; to our army, air and sea cadets learning to protect and guard us, thank you!

Remember today the gift and importance of individual friendships and loyalty, each to the other, and that the gift of life itself is precious. There is too much cruelty and division in our world instead of peace and mercy. The Beatitudes we have heard again in the Gospel just now, are surely the best manifesto and pledge to keep war at bay and honour the common good; hallow and bless us, we pray, to the One who happily made us and abides with us, until we, in God's time, 'knock on heaven's door', and enter in.
