REFLECTION

"The affairs of men rarely allow for a simple choice between good and evil, light and darkness. Whatever you choose to do is wrong because the whole of our nature is wrong; there is a profound distortion at the root of things which makes all our choices corrupt to some degree. And this was Pilate's dilemma. He was in an appalling situation. If he released Jesus he would provoke a riot, many would be killed and reports would be sent to Rome. His own usefulness in a tense situation would be compromised. On the other hand Jesus is innocent, and he knows it, and the whole genius of Roman law was, in theory, for the protection of a man's rights. How was he to act? Jesus, we read, recognized his dilemma and had compassion on him, compassion because he was in a position of power. 'You would have no power over me, unless it had been given you from above; therefore he who delivered me to you has the greater sin' (John 19:11). The Christian by this word is called upon to feel compassion for those in power; to sympathize with them in their dilemmas.

Pilate made the inevitable decision, the only decision he could make. He sacrificed one innocent man for the sake of maintaining peace. Churchill and Poland. Pilate and Christ. What other decision was humanly possible? We would have done the same. And yet, we know both decisions were wrong. What is this tragic flaw in humanity that forces us to make these decisions? And we have all made decisions like this. We have turned our backs on the needs of others, on the demands they make on us, because we have other responsibilities. We have families, we have jobs, we have unavoidable obligations. We live in the midst of excruciating dilemmas. I am Pontius Pilate. Every day I make the unavoidable decision to hand over Christ. He suffered under Pontius Pilate. I am Pontius Pilate, and he allows himself to suffer at my hands. These are some of the most momentous words in history."

In the services of Holy Week, we have most certainly got it – a beautiful and compelling set of services – but we don't always flaunt it. Our offerings are sometimes pinched and mean. We need, rather, to revel in the sensuous and very hands-on re-enactment of liturgical drama. Think of Holy Week as an opera (an art form which is itself a heady blend of poetry, drama and music), and think of Palm Sunday as the overture. "
